Home for Christmas

"I was alone. I slept in shelters when I could get a bed, but if I wasn't in line early enough I was just on the street, sleeping under bridges." Sally is remembering her recent past. "I was drinking, drugging, not caring. I was the walking dead."

Sally is one of the first women to move into Kansas City Rescue Mission's Women's Center, and since she arrived almost four months ago, so much has changed. For Sally, years of the street life ... with all its awfulness ... have ended. Today she lives a life where she feels "safe. I'm safe here," she says quietly.

At the KCRM Women's Center, Sally wakes each morning in a warm, comfortable bed to a day that's filled with three good meals, counseling, life-skills classes, prayer, Bible study and much more. And at the close of each day, she has put years of addiction, compromise and abuse even further behind her.

"I don't have to live the old life anymore," Sally smiles. "This is my new life now."

Her new life won't be free from difficult days. As Christmas draws near, Sally knows she will struggle with loneliness. "I always dread Christmas, because I'm always alone. I haven't been able to see my kids or be with family for years.

"But the ladies here and the staff here, this is my family now!" Sally's eyes light up as she talks. "What's different this Christmas is that I will be with them — my new family!"

Christmas is about family.



Everyday Miracles

When KCRM Health Clinic Coordinator Liz Preston, RN *(pictured below)* saw Bill's note from Truman Medical Center, she knew she'd need all her nursing skills and more to meet his needs.

"Bill came here because he needed to be off the street due to severe frostbite. His doctor noted he **would** lose six of his toes," Liz says. "I took it as a challenge; my goal was that he would lose **none** of his toes."

The result, says Liz, was a miracle. "I did my part in the natural and asked God to do what He would in the supernatural. It took months of individualized care, but as of today, *he has all 10 toes and he is sober!"**

We asked Liz how folks could help meet the needs of homeless men as the cold and wet weather sets in. "The men line up at my door asking

for lotion for dry skin, socks and foot powder because their feet are often wet, lip balm and cough drops.

"Many come from the emergency room with prescriptions they can't get filled so we need funding for prescription assistance. The addition of the Women's Center makes this even more critical."
